1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Rangia College is the premier institution of higher education on the north bank of the Brahmaputra in the district of Kamrup. The college was founded on August 5, 1963, as a result of the untiring and selfless dedication of a band of frontrunners under the inspiring leadership of Late Siddhinath Sarma, a hardcore Gandhian of the freedom movement who was popularly known as the Chanakya of Assam politics. Since then the college has offered dignified services to the community in the domain of higher education in a vast and extensive area predominantly inhabited by culturally matured but economically backward segments of the population.

The college has endeavored to maintain a very healthy and cordial relationship with the neighborhood and contributed in its own humble way towards academic awareness in particular and social welfare in general. That the college authority in 1993 parted with a plot of 30 bighas of landed property for the construction of a Civil Hospital speaks volumes of a humanitarian gesture for a noble cause.

We are aware that the changing scenario in the field of academic and environmental-related issues and thereby the challenges before the HEI like us are many and varied. We are determined to cope up to these manfully whatever may be the size and shape of the constraints.

In the present-day context, quality is the defining factor of a higher educational institution. The institutions of higher learning like this one join the process of quality checks to prove their credentials in terms of performance and achievements. This process, we hope, will bring about an element of transparency and credibility that will contribute in a big way to maximizing their potential. This is why we went in for Assessment and Accreditation by NAAC in 2004 (B++) and 2010(B) and now are ready for the third cycle of assessment and accreditation.

The college has a vision of building the college as a rural university within the next ten years. It aims to achieve the following objectives:

- Ø To produce quality students equipped with moral, spiritual, and aesthetic values to face the challenges of life.
- Ø To create a pragmatic approach in the minds of the students to the socio-economic realities of life.
- Ø To take up such other academic program which may be deemed necessary from time to time

The college fulfills its mission by creating an academic environment for the holistic development of the students under the guiding principles of Social Commitment, Unity in Diversity, Inclusiveness, Accountability, Accessibility, and Gender Sensitivity. The serene atmosphere of the college campus with a sprawling 35% of greenery provides students with a conducive environment for study for which Honorable members of the NAAC peer team compared the campus with “Ashram” in 2004.

The college has introduced Arts (1963), Science(1985) , Commerce(1996), B.Voc(2015), MA in Arabic(2016-17), MA in Bodo(2018-19), MA in Economics(2020). Self-financed courses have been introduced in PGDCA(2009), BCA(2014-15), BPES(2018-19), and BBA (2020). Counseling and mentoring have also been running as part of the extracurricular activities for a substantially large section of students. With the thrust area of the college curriculum as designed by the Gauhati University mainly centered on generation and transmission of knowledge, the onus of fulfilling the social responsibility like creating general awareness on the problems of gender equality, health, and hygiene, women empowerment, cleanliness, etc. is left to the extension education activities of the college.

Whatever shape and form the college could achieve at the beginning was all due to humble contributions made by the public in general. The destiny of the college was guided by the past and present members of the Governing Body and the Principals of the college under whose stewardship the college made noteworthy progress both in terms of physical development and academic achievements.

The notable infrastructural development achieved by the college is due to the financial assistance provided by the State government, and UGC, RUSA, DST, and DBT made it possible to complete the infrastructures like Auditorium, Indoor stadium, Hostels, Digital Classrooms, Library, Conference hall, Meditation Hall, etc. It is worthwhile to mention that Dr. Monmohan Singh, then Prime minister of India, and Mr. Bhubaneswar Kalita, present MP contributed from their MP fund for the college auditorium. Ex MLA, Mr. Ananta Deka, and Mr. Ramen Deka, EX MP, contributed to constructing the students’ cycle stand, and Yoga and Meditation Hall respectively. The entire PG block is under construction with the fund provided by the Local MLA and President of the State BJP, Mr. Bhabash Kalita.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Rangia College is affiliated with Gauhati University. Gauhati University has introduced the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in affiliated colleges like us in 2019. The college strictly adheres to the curriculum

designed and modeled for different courses under GU and effectively implements the syllabus prescribed by the affiliating university. The College offers a wide range of programs under faculties – Arts, Science, Commerce, and vocational courses. The offered programs include 61 courses at the UG level and 4 courses at the PG level. Self-financing courses have been introduced in Computer applications (PGDCA), BCA, BPE, and BBA. Counseling and Mentoring have been running as part of the extracurricular activities. It is noteworthy to mention that few faculty members of the College are actively associated with the syllabus committees for designing the syllabus at the UG level. While students enrolled in a program are supposed to enjoy flexibility in respect of time frame and non-core options, elective options are available and horizontal mobility within and across a discipline is allowed to a limited extent depending upon the satisfaction of the authorities concerned.

The curriculum delivery system of the college is well planned and student-centric. The academic calendar for the upcoming academic year gets prepared in the month of July incorporating a few important events from the academic calendar of the GU. At the beginning of an academic session, the heads of the departments draw out a detailed timetable, teaching plan, and internal assessment planning for the whole session. The plan shows a unit-wise break-up of the syllabus to be covered and distributed to the other faculty members. It is meant for completing the syllabus within a stipulated period. The department records the daily classes taken by different teachers through a logbook and reviews the same in departmental meetings.

The IQAC of the college has a well-planned online and offline feedback system. Feedback from all the students and faculties is taken and the IQAC analyses the feedback and takes appropriate action. The feedback report is made available on the college website. Besides, the Principal as chairperson of the IQAC makes it convenient to interact from time to time with the teaching community on vital academic issues.

The college has been trying its best for the holistic development of students for competence and a productive career in a challenging and competitive world.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Rangia college provides a vibrant teaching-learning ambiance inside the campus. Students from neighboring places with a variety of ethnicity and economic as well as cultural background seek admission into the institution. The college, along with enrolling this variety of students also strictly adheres to the Government of India reservation policy. The average percentage of the seats filled in reserve categories is 85%. The average percentage of enrollment in the college in the last five years is 95%.

The faculty strength of nearly 91% of teachers filled against sanction posts. At present forth four faculty members have Ph.D. The average experience of full-time teachers in the same college is approximately 20 years, which ensures quality education to the students with a student-teacher ratio of 1:39. The college encourages the teachers to go for regular refresher courses, along with seminars and workshops to enhance their knowledge and teaching skills. The departments on their part, along with cooperation from IQAC and the Principal organize invited lectures, seminars, workshops, and field trips to supplement the knowledge base of students.

The college has provided ICT-equipped classrooms and a digitalized library and encourages students to use technology to go through e-content and e-pathshala available on UGC websites, SWAYAM as well as YouTube. For the vocational courses, the college has tie-ups with different business establishments and sends the students for internships.

The college conducts all the examinations as directed by Gauhati University. It has a well-dedicated examination committee under the supervision of the Principal which ensures the smooth functioning of Sessional examinations and final examinations. Besides, the individual departments, on their part conducts Class Test and Field Visits, Excursions, Hand on Training, and assign Project Work for the academic enhancement of the students. All examinations are conducted to ensure transparency and efficacy.

Besides, the college also has mentoring and counseling classes keeping in mind the mental health of the students. It is done by Extension Education Cell under IQAC.

The college has a Grievance Redressal Cell, Health Care Unit, Students Union, NCC, and NSS unit for catering to the various needs and problems of students.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The College promotes a research culture among faculty members and students. The interest of the college in research activities has been seen in various seminars and workshops organized by the college over the years. The college encourages faculty members to undertake projects and consultancy services to enhance research activities on campus. The college has 4 Research Guides under Gauhati University. The college has received two major research projects worth around Rupees 58.46 lakh from DBT for advanced level Biohub, 34.56 lakh from SITA for medicinal garden and one faculty member received Rs4.25 lakh from ICHR for research work this year.

Knowledge sharing is the key aspect of the research activity in the college. Four PhD students have registered as research scholars in the college. Faculty members of the college have published 107 books and chapters, Thirty-one research publications are in the UGC CARE list and a few are indexed by Scopus/WoS/ICI.

Few programmes were organized pertaining to Research Methodology, Intellectual Property Rights, Entrepreneurship and Skill Development.

Sixty-four per cent of faculty members have PhD degrees. Seven faculty avail Faculty Improvement Programme(FIP) for pursuing research work so far. College authority encourages to take research work and do the needful formalities in a priority manner. Faculty are also encouraged to join workshops, and seminars like LMS, MOOCs, SWAYAM etc.

A perennial effort has been done in sensitizing students towards environmental issues, gender disparities, social ethics etc. and in inculcating social values and commitment to society. The college conducts a number of activities through Extension Education Cell. Few departments, NCC, NSS and Women's Research cell, and Library have carried out various activities for the empowerment and benefit of the neighbourhood communities that have benefitted the community and the students as well. Extension activities have made a notable impact on sensitizing students towards issues like health issues, Environment conservation, social harmony, etc. Apart from this, the college library has extended its support to the neighbourhood community through lending and donating books to underprivileged schools.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

With a built-up area of 13,000 sqm. The college has adequate infrastructure, and learning resources including

ICT-enabled classrooms, seminar hall, auditorium, laboratories, advanced laboratory Biohub and Greenhouse, computer labs, library, other support facilities, etc.

The College has an indoor stadium and playground for sports and other extracurricular activities. A yoga and meditation hall for mental health. An Eco garden cum biodiversity forest to study the eco-diversity system under the NSS unit. Five solar-powered lamp posts are used in the evening hours. The scenic beauty of the plantation gives the college a green look.

The college has 110 computers in all, out of this 87 are used by the students and faculty for educational purposes. The college has facilities like a separate Administrative Block, Library Establishment, IQAC office room, Examination Control room & Zonal Examination Cell, separate room for NCC, NSS, Bharat Scout and Guide, Women's Studies Research Cell, Health Care Cell, Teachers Common room, Guestroom, Alumni office, Thrift & Credit Society room, and Distance Education Centre. Guard rooms are available for security guards, and a CCTV surveillance system provides security to the college. A car parking shade and a cycle cum scooter shade at the front side of the college. A printing press meets the printing requirement. Disposable items are kept in two storerooms. The campus ensures the availability of facilities like a canteen with hygienic and wholesome food, a Xerox facility, clean toilets, adequate water purifiers, common rooms, Girls' changing rooms, an e-waste room, and a Sweeper Quarter. etc.

The library is a separate block and entirely Wi-Fi enabled and partially automated run through SOUL 2.0 and OPEC. The College has 40,404 textbooks and 20,013 reference books. In addition to this, the college library offers access to 5800 e-books and 25 Journals., a few collections of rare books, and a book corner with special references to North-East India. Library automation and learning Resources like e-Journals, e-books, e-resource centers, and N List are available to faculty and students and can be accessed online also. Each department of the college has a Seminar Library. For the poor meritorious students, the library has **Book Bank** facilities to support their studies.

Student Support and Progression

The college believes in the holistic development of students. It provides a number of opportunities to participate in co-curricular and extension activities. The college has functional and effective students support mechanisms like Counseling and Mentoring Cell under Extension Education Cell, Information and Career Guidance Cell (ICGC), Grievance and Redressal cell, Internal Complaint Committee, and Rangia College Student's Union (RCSU) to look after students-related matters. The college extends financial support through government scholarships like Ishan Uday, SC-ST-OBC, and Minority and Merit scholarships. Under the free admission scheme of the state government, 82% of students below BPL got free admission last year. The college extends financial support to needy students from the institution's welfare scheme.

The College has a transparent mechanism for timely redressal of student grievances including sexual harassment and ragging cases. The college has Implementation of guidelines from statutory bodies and has developed an offline grievance submission mechanism.

Requisite information regarding administration, admissions, programs with outcomes, examinations, and amenities are provided on the college website. Noticeboards are hung in prominent places for vital information.

Many of our students have qualified for the NET/ SLET/GATE and Teachers Eligibility Test (TET) examination and are rendering services in various schools and colleges. For instance, in 2019-20, 14 students

have cleared different competitive exams like NET, SET, SLET, and civil service examination. Four hundred and eighty-six students have been admitted to different HEI for higher studies in the last five years. The college organizes different events at the institution level every year.

The Rangia College Student Union (RCSU) body is an elected body of the students constituted as per recommendations of the Lyngdoh Committee and guidelines of the Supreme Court of India. The students' representatives are enthused with the responsibilities of looking after the welfare of the students. The student participated in various activities like Constitution day, Voters' day, International Yoga Day, World Environment Day, International Literacy Day, Teachers Day, etc, and other co-curricular and extracurricular activities of the college. The NCC unit both male and female wings and the NSS unit also take an active part in extension activities in and outside the college campus. Students are encouraged to participate in cultural and sports activities. Students of the college have participated in various competitions such as youth festivals; inter-college sports competitions, all Assam debating competitions,s, etc.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Governing Body(GB) is the apex body of the college that plans policies in tune with the vision and mission of the college. The DHE of Assam and GU constitute the GB as per govt. guidelines. The Principal is the chief executive who is responsible for smooth running and management and also execution and implementation of various policies and programs done with the help of IQAC and different committees. Different statutory bodies like Grievance Redressal Cell, Internal Complaint Committee, and different cell/committees like examination committee, admission committee, anti-ragging committee, etc are constituted and responsibilities are decentralized to attract participatory governance for smooth functioning of the college.

The college has a Performance Appraisal System for teaching staff that strictly follows the UGC regulation on minimum qualifications for appointment and promotion. The code of conduct of the teachers is strictly followed as per the Office Memorandum of the DHE, Govt. of Assam.

The college has a vibrant IQAC, aware of its responsibilities toward quality-related matters of the college. It plays a catalytic role in the quality improvement of the college. The IQAC has organized quality-related seminars and workshops. IQAC meetings prepare are regularly held to discuss different academic and non-academic matters. The IQAC prepares and submits the AQAR, annual GU report, AISHE, and other government-related reports on time. The feedback system of the students and teachers and orientation programs for fresh students are organized soon after the admission procedure is completed. Departmental profiles are prepared under the guidance of IQAC. The performance of each faculty member is assessed annually at the end of the year.

The examination branch executes all the internal and external examinations under GU as per the academic calendar of the GU. The academic calendar of the college is prepared at the beginning of a new session. The calendar earmarks a few important activities like College Week, Fresher's, Election of the students union, etc.

The college has welfare schemes for the staff named "Rangia College Employees Cooperative Thrift and Credit Society limited", a registered society. It provides loans for different purposes to the members. PF, Gratuity, Medical Insurance, and Child care leave for female faculty are provided as per govt. rule.

Rangia College conducts both internal and external financial audits on regular basis. However, environmental audits and energy audits are not done. This year's academic audit was completed in the first week of July.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

Safety is one of the major issues for the girl students. The College provides a safe and secure atmosphere for girl students. Security personnel (Gents & Ladies) are appointed at college entrances and at Girl's hostel; night watchmen have been appointed for the safety at night. The CCTV camera surveillance system has been installed in different parts of the campus. The college author keeps in contact with the local Police Station for any untoward situation. To redress the grievances of the girl students the Internal Complaint Cell is there.

The women's Studies Research cell (WSRC) of this institution is trying to ensure a gender-friendly environment not only within the institution but also in the surrounding area. The college organizes gender equity promotion programs such as Lecture on Laws protecting Women, Free health camp for girl students and neighboring women, Personality Development and counseling classes, etc. The college has common rooms for girls with the facilities of a toilet and sanitary pad incinerator.

The Extension Education Cell of the institution takes initiatives to aware the students about the different issues. Mentoring and counseling classes for the students look up the extracurricular activities as well as the mental health of the students.

A Botanical garden and ECO Zone are the hot spot for Flora and Fauna for the students, especially those studying live science. There are approximately 150 varieties of species on the campus. All plants have been labeled with local and scientific names. Two ponds inside the college campus enhance biodiversity with the presence of a variety of fish, amphibians, reptiles, etc.

Awareness regarding cleanliness and a good drainage system keep the campus clean.

World environment day and environmental-related seminars, popular talks, etc. are organized on the campus. Plantation inside the campus has become a habit of the college. A booklet named "My Plant My Responsibility" has been published by IQAC to encourage students for plantation.

Different cultural events belonging to different communities are celebrated every year on the college campus and they are a remarkable showcase of peace and harmony amongst the student community.

The campus has been declared a Plastic-free zone. The initiative has been taken to reduce the use of paper in official work by digitalizing the administration

<p>2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>In the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the Academic Bank Credits (ABC) have been incorporated by the Government of India. The scheme has the provisions of creating a digital infrastructure that will store the academic credits earned by the students of various higher education institutes within the country. Provisions of Academic bank of Credit facilitate multiple entries and exit points in their academic programs. This is an innovative idea to earn and deposit credit through National schemes like MOOC, SWAYAM, NPTEL, and Virtual lab. It shall be also considered for credit transfer and accumulation in this provision. Through these students will be able to earn credits and get the program completed. ABC will promote quality, flexibility, access, and equity to improve the higher education system. Rangia College is planning to do awareness about ABC among the students so that they open their ABC so they can experience a multidisciplinary, skill-based, and flexible curriculum structure.</p>
<p>3. Skill development:</p>	<p>UGC has introduced Kushal Kendras, community colleges, and B.Voc Programmes realizing the importance and the necessity of developing skills among students and creating work-ready manpower for the nation. Understanding the reality Rangia college introduced two vocational courses Retail Management and Information Technology(RMIT) and Catering Technology and Hotel Management (CTHM) during 2015-16 under UG level based on National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF). In 2020 three more vocational courses viz Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT), Travel and Tourism Management (MLT), and Sattriya Dance (SD) have been introduced under GU to meet the demands of the students. The college aims at providing quality vocational education through B.Voc courses combining classroom-centred formal education and</p>

	<p>training with experience sharing with Industry practitioners and internships in business houses. The focus is on integrated knowledge acquisition and upgrading human skills toward creating a new band of employable youth. However, the present CBCS course run by the Gauhati University offers a Skill Enhancement paper with different topics and syllabi. The programme structure and contents adhere to the UGC guidelines for vocational programmes in line with National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF). With these steps, the college is marching towards the implementation of NEP in the real sense.</p>
<p>4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):</p>	<p>Rangia College, situated in the lower Kamrup district of Assam, has a rich heritage and has always believed in the preservice and spread of Indian knowledge. To impart knowledge of the ancient Indian religious texts such as Vedas, Upanishads and other religious scriptures, the subject of Sanskrit has been availed for the students. Subjects like Bodo and Assamese have been running as full-fledged departments which very much serve the purpose of expanding of mother language. To create an environment of holistic learning wherein the teacher and student engage more closely with each other to promote the academic, creative and mental well-being of the student, a Mentoring and Counseling Programme is running in the institution. The college has set up a Meditation Hall to take care of the mental well-being of both the students as well as teachers. To inculcate human values and a spirit of service in the students, a number of community-driven activities have been initiated under the NSS with the collaborative effort of teachers and students. To grow respect and devotion towards the country, Voters' Day, Constitutional Day, etc. are organized with the active participation of the students. Rangia College offers 65 courses across Arts, Science, Commerce, Computer science, and vocational courses. All these courses are offered as</p>

	<p>outcomes-based education(OBE) which are designed keeping in mind the regional and national requirements. As our college is affiliated with the GU, implemented outcome-based education with clearly stated Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes. All courses are designed to develop the abilities to understand, analyze, apply and evaluate.</p>
<p>6. Distance education/online education:</p>	<p>During the Covid 19 pandemic, educational institutions have increasingly been involved in using digital platforms. Online classes were conducted effectively by faculties in all programs. Both teachers and learners have experienced the online teaching and evaluation process through different platforms like Zoom, Google classroom, etc. This experience of accessing online resources by the faculty members and students will now help them to cope with the new environment of the NEP. However, the college has had distance learning centers like Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (KKHSOP) and the Institute of Distance and Open Learning since 2017.</p>

4. Quality Indicator Framework(QIF)

Criterion 1 - Curricular Aspects

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Rangia College offers a wide range of programs under three streams – Arts, Science, and Commerce. The college strictly adheres to the curriculum designed and modeled for different courses under GU and is fully aware of the methodology adopted in preparing the courses. The Institution strives to follow the curriculum through meticulous documentation. It has a well-planned curriculum delivery system that ensures consistency in the teaching and learning process. The institution undertakes several steps keeping ahead of the vision and mission and ensures the development and deployment of action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum. Some of the steps followed by the institution to deliver the same are:

∅ Lesson plans are prepared in the departmental meeting at the start of the session to present the curriculum according to the GU syllabus, keeping in view the time limit for completing the syllabus. In addition, the daily progress report (Log Book) keeps track of the daily classes according to the central schedule of the college.

∅ The departmental attendance registers are kept upto-date. Each student's attendance percentage determines his or her internal assessment scores. Furthermore, according to the Lyngdoh Commission, if a student wishes to be a candidate for RCSU office, he or she must have a fixed percentage of attendance.

∅ A comprehensive timetable is prepared prior to the start of classes, taking into account tutorial and remedial classes, mentoring classes, self-financed classes, and co-curricular activities such as NCC, NSS, and various club activities, etc. Later, the head assigns the classes to the faculty members for fruitful and timely completion of the syllabus.

∅ The college organizes Orientation Programmes for newcomers at the commencement of the semester to familiarize them with the college curriculum, rules and regulations and also to make them aware of their responsibilities as students of a prestigious institution like ours.

∅ Tutorial classes are held at the end of each week to facilitate the students to clarify their doubts, which could arise from the lectures they attended during the week.

∅ The concerned departments keep track of tutorial and remedial classes, mentoring sessions, and home assignments.

∅ Apart from academic activities, the departments also engage in activities such as seminars, lecture programs, fieldwork, projects, and other curriculum-related activities. Important days are observed to make the students aware of societal values and issues, such as World Environment Day, World Water Day, International Yoga Day, International Youth Day, International Women's Day, and so on.

∅ Infusion of the ICT element into the teaching-learning methodology extended the classroom even up to the door of the students. Home assignments, class tests, etc done through online mode by means of Google form, Google classroom, WhatsApp, Zoom/Google meet platform gives a paradigm shift in the learning process.

∅ Through the curriculum, the institute also seeks to instill social responsibility by boosting awareness about issues such as equality, health, hygiene, and cleanliness, among students.

1.1.2 The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of CIE

Response:

The annual academic calendar is central to any institution. The academic calendar of Rangia College is prepared in line with the university calendar and includes the various activities of the college to be conducted during the academic session. The calendar is designed to make the teachers and students aware of all activities related to ongoing internal evaluation, various kinds of academic and non-academic activities, and successful and timely completion of all activities during the academic session. Rangia College publishes the academic calendar every year at the beginning of the academic session. The calendar is uploaded on the college websites. It is also incorporated in the prospectus of the college, which is prepared by a committee that has been specially assigned for this task. It is updated and revised in accordance with the changes suggested by the university. The academic calendar of Rangia College specifies details such as :

∅. The tentative date of commencement of the sessional examination.

∅. The calendar ascertains the total number of working days and holidays for a particular session.

∅. Various activities like examinations, orientation programs, RCSU election, college week, etc are specified. In case there are some deviations from the assigned dates for certain activities, the college authority issues notifications.

The CIE is related to the parent university; it is little or no scope of change in the examination pattern since the college follows the guidelines laid down by the university. CIE

includes class tests, attendance, home assignment, group discussion, excursion project/ fieldwork, and the project viva-voice, The following steps are taken for continuous internal evaluation(CIE) of the students:

1. **Marks for attendance.** The department keeps a record of each student's attendance and assigns marks to students based on their attendance percentage.
2. **Marks for home assignment.** Each department gives home assignments to the students as per the notice of the exam. Questions for the home assignments are generally given in the class and are also forwarded to students' Whatsapp groups and Google Classroom.

3. **Marks for excursion/ project/ fieldwork report.** Students are required to do projects or field visits as part of the curriculum and submit the project/report within the timeline set by the respective department.
4. **Marks for seminar presentations/ group discussions.** During the corresponding subject hour, departments conduct seminars/group discussions on a certain topic of a subject. Each student is given a grade based on his/her presentation.
5. **Sessional examination marks are also given as a part of CIE.** Students and teachers are given advance notice of sessional examinations by the examination branch. The examination branch prepares the sessional examination schedule, which is posted on the college website. The answer scripts of sessional examinations are evaluated by the respective departments.

Moreover, home assignments and class tests, etc are some of the good practices of the institution. Segregating the slow learners through these CIE and arrangement of the tutorial classes as per the scheduled routine helps the students to cope with the rest of the students. Continuous online guidance through WhatsApp groups/ individual interaction helps them to feel connected with the teachers.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics ,Gender, Human Values ,Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Response:

The institution strictly adheres to the curriculum given by the university. Gauhati University has included a few topics related to professional ethics, gender parity, human values, etc. in the syllabus of the undergraduate programs. Environmental science is taught in the first-semester course as one of the compulsory papers. However, the institute is aware of the burning issues of society and makes the students aware in a planned manner. Some of them are

? **Professional Ethics:** The college makes an attempt to familiarize the students with professional ethics through various co-curricular programs. Departments such as Commerce, B.voc, and Political science strive to instill professional ethics in the mind of the students through industry tours, on-the-job training, and state assembly visits. Orientation programs are organized for fresh students to make them aware of professional ethics, examination ethics, etc and so on. However, the rules and regulations of the college are made available for the student in the Prospectus, which is normally published in the month of July every year along with the initiation of the admission procedure.

? **Gender sensibility** As the college has a co-education status, the authority is well aware of the gender sensibility of the students and takes necessary steps to raise the issues which arise through different cells in a systematic procedure as and when required. Rangia College women's studies and research cell is always focusing on gender sensitivity and sensitization. The women's studies and research cell celebrated International Women's Day and International literacy day, hosted a series of popular talks on women's empowerment and gender issues, and arranged free health checkup camp for women. In addition, the Rangia College N.C.C unit hosted specific self-defense training sessions for girls.

? **Human values:** Human values are well understood and utmost care is given to their exploration along with providing a platform for their best use. In the orientation programs, students are guided to join the NCC, NSS, Bharat Scouts and Guide (B & C Guide), and EEC for their physical and mental well-being. The Red Cross cell organized a COVID-19 awareness program in rural areas before the lockdown. During the winter session, the college NSS unit organized a clothes distribution drive for the needy and helpless people. On the basis of valid proof, the college also offers scholarships to students.

? **Environment and Sustainability:** Students are aware of the global environmental crisis and are encouraged to join different activities undertaken by the institution. The institution's eco-friendly campus, the Botanical garden, the overall scenic beauty, the cleanliness of the campus, and, above all, the sense of belongingness with the environment is being inculcated in the mind of the students. From time to time, the NSS unit organizes cleanliness programs at various places in the neighboring area of the college. Tobacco bans are strictly enforced at the college. With the goal of creating a sustainable campus, the college also

has solar energy facilities and hazardous chemical management facilities. At the time of admission, each student has to give an undertaking for planting a sapling at a convenient place where he/she might take proper care of it. All such works are done for the protection of our environment.

Response:

Whether a learner is advanced or slow is first of all found out through observing them in the class. A teacher, while taking the class asks various questions and through their responses over a period of time identifies the learners. The department conducts surprise tests, unit tests, group discussions, seminars and other such activities which helps them identify the advanced learners and slow learners. Besides these, the college conducts sectional examinations for each semester (honors and generic) as per the guidelines of the affiliating university.

For the slow learners, the college takes up the following activities :

1. The teachers of the institution closely observe the students in the classroom.
2. The department and faculty members monitor the attendance of the student regularly and if found absent continuously for a week, the student and his/her peers as well as parents are contacted.
3. The teachers mentor and provide counseling classes and try to sort out the problem if any
4. Organizes parents teachers meet.
5. The faculty members use ppts and other audio visual aids to make the learning interesting and easy to understand. The students are also provided with notes.
6. Develop Lessons that Incorporate Students' Interests, Needs, and Experiences. Arrange extra tutorial or extra curriculum activities.
7. Encouraging them to devote themselves more time in basic studies. Simplify subject matter as much as possible.
8. Game playing, Group discussion, Extra curricular activities, Assignments etc

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Learning by doing is one of the best procedures for delivering knowledge. It is observed that participating in project work or fieldwork is not only participatory but also joyful. Most of the science subjects have laboratory practicals, industry visits, excursions which gives the students exposure to experimental learning. Some of the departments organize workshops, training beyond the laboratories. The faculty of arts is accustomed to do celebration/observing a nationally significant day and visiting the assembly session, literary festival, graduate congress, visiting HEI like IIT-G, GU, NEHU, etc. thereby relating themselves to the eco system.

The national / state level of competitive examinations, organized by departments like Assam Physical Society, National Graduate Physics Examination organized by IAPT, Olympiad in Chemistry, Super 30, career counseling seminars/workshops etc. help students to build up their confidence and support after their graduation.

Moreover, the institution promotes the functions organized by students related to the culture of a community like Saraswati puja, Bathou Puja(Bodo), Fateha-E-Dwaz Daham, Sankar Dev Utshav, the freshmen social, Election of the students union, Sports and Cultural Festival (College Week), and state-level debate competition for cultural integration and harmony so that they could learn the need of managerial and problem-solving capability.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

Teachers of the institution have adopted the ICT-enabled tool to enhance the teaching and learning experiences of the students. Majority of the teachers are created virtual classrooms using Google classroom/ Zoom applications semester-wise to enhance communication and collaboration. They facilitated the organization of course content in a digital plate. The assessments and evaluation are also done thereby managing the class in a digital classroom.

Ø. In a regular classroom most of the class time is spent to develop a higher cognitive level of the students in the presence of the teacher. The reading material for home assignment given to the students on Google classroom and Whatsapp groups are discussed and queries are made so that the students understand the content of the topic.

Ø. In the out-of-class component of the classroom is mostly transmission of information which is done in the form of class notes, reading material, home assignment, videos etc

Ø. Institute has five numbers of ICT classrooms, seminar halls and auditorium. Teachers use these facilities during their classes, organizing seminars workshops, etc.

Ø. Teachers also show keen interest to participate in the webinar/seminar, on the use of ICT in classroom teaching, organized by different HEI.

Ø. IQAC also conducts orientation programs on the application and use of the tools available in the institution.

Rangia College is an affiliated college of the Gauhati University and is guided by the regulations formulated at the university level in the matters pertaining to syllabus, examination and evaluation.

A transparent, time-bound, and effective method is being followed by the institution in terms of dealing with internal assessment-related grievances. The criterion for the evaluation of the internal assessment is displayed in the college website and prospectus. Students are also informed about the evaluation criteria through the institutional and departmental orientation programme. It is also recapitulated by teachers from time to time during regular classes. Various processes for internal assessment are being followed throughout the semester. Some of them are- Sessional examination / Home assignments /Laboratory internal assessment /Project evaluations /Field visit evaluation, etc.

Sessional examination Assessments:

Sessional examinations are conducted as per the time frame given by the university. The institution conducts the Sessional examinations of the major course under the supervision of the departments. The Sessional examination of the regular courses is conducted by the examination committee. Immediately after the examination, the evaluation is done within the time frame given by the authority. The mark sheet is displayed in the departmental notice board. The evaluated answer sheets are shown to students if required. If any discrepancies are reported by the students, then they are made clear by the faculty immediately.

Assignments: The home assignment

Faculty members evaluate home assignments based on the rubric such as submission date, mode of submission, etc. The evaluated assignments are shown to students, thus maintaining the transparency of the marks assigned and meeting up of the grievances.

Lab experiments-

An internal assessment mark is given to the student as per the performance of the student in the laboratory classes. The lab rubric is given as per university norms.

Project/field report evaluation-

Project submission is conducted in front of faculties and students in groups/individuals. The rubric is

designed having the criteria of preparation of the project report, presentation of the project in PPT format.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1 Extension activities are carried out in the neighborhood community, sensitizing students to social issues, for their holistic development, and impact thereof during the last five years.

Response:

The college believes in the holistic development of students and promotes regular engagement of faculty, students, and staff with the neighborhood community for the sustainable development of the community through various activities. Every Year, the college organizes various programs under which students and staff participate in community-based activities with the neighborhood through participatory approaches.

Following are some programs that the institute has carried out over the last five years:

1. World Environment day was organized by the Women's Studies Research Cell for creating awareness among students regarding various environmental issues.
2. International Literacy Day is organized by the Women's Studies Research Cell to motivate students to educate illiterate people. Students also realize that educating the illiterate is a service to the nation.
3. Hands-on training program on “ Basic application of Microbiology” in collaboration with DBT New Delhi (BLISS program)
4. Institute has organized a Blood Sugar Detection program in collaboration with HS School, BIO HUB for creating awareness of health among students and village people in Tamulpur.
5. Organized a one-day workshop on Computer science for high school students in collaboration with IIT Guwahati.
6. Electrical and electronics projects for sixth-semester degree students organized by the department of physics to make them self-reliant.
7. Biocontrol in different plant diseases organized by Rangia College in association with DBT, Government of India under the scheme, awareness on Disaster Management. The program hosted 75 farmers who highly benefited from the program. The participants learned about the ways to protect the plants from diseases through natural things instead of using pesticides. The farmers were encouraged to use biocontrol as the use of pesticides in plants can badly harm human beings.
8. The college organized an awareness program namely “swachata he sewa” Under the direction of the Kamrup district Administration to maintain cleanliness in and around the campus and to create awareness about the role of a clean environment in human health.

The students of our college actively participate in social service activities leading to their overall development. The college effectively runs the National Service Scheme and National Cadet Corps Units. Through these units, the college undertakes various extension activities in the neighborhood community.

NSS volunteers address social issues which include cleanliness, tree plantation, water conservation,

environmental awareness, Women empowerment, National Integrity, Run for Fitness, the Swachhta program, Girl child awareness, etc.

The NCC unit of the college comes under 1BN NCC. It aims at developing qualities of leadership, patriotism, maintaining discipline, character building, the spirit of adventure, and the idea of self-service. The NCC unit of the college organizes various extension activities such as tree plantation, Road safety awareness, Fit India program, Save fuel program, Swachhta Abhiyan, etc.

Impact & Sensitization:

All these activities have a positive impact on the students and it develops student community relationship, leadership skill, and self-confidence of students. It also helps in cultivating the hidden personality of students and creates awareness among students. Exposure to various outreach activities sensitizes the students toward various socio-economic activities. The activities conducted by the college help students to understand the values of social responsibility such as helping people in need and distress, the importance of green and sustainable development, the importance of organic farming, gender equality, etc. In addition to this, these activities also developed various skills such as communication skills, management skills, leadership skills, analytical skills etc. among students.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

Rangia College has been providing quality education to students since its inception in 1963 and it has been successful in maintaining its record till the present. The college has adequate infrastructure to support a huge number of students which is around 3000 at present. The campus of Rangia College has an area of 17.29 acres. The college has sufficient classrooms and labs for the smooth conduct of classes for students of all semesters. The college has a total of 42 classrooms of which 5 classrooms have LCD facilities and two classrooms have Wi-Fi/LAN facilities. There are 101 computers for students and teachers to use. The college has one auditorium where seminars and functions are held. There is also one conference hall where seminars and talks are held from time to time. All ICT facilitated halls are also used as seminar halls when necessary. For conduction of practical classes, there are 20 laboratories belonging to the departments of Botany (3), Zoology (3), Chemistry (2), Physics (4), Geography (2), Biotech Hub (1), Computer Science (3), Education (1) and B.Voc (2). There is one Yoga and Meditation Hall under Self Empowerment Cell.

4.1.2 The Institution has adequate facilities for cultural activities, sports, games (indoor, outdoor), gymnasium, yoga centre etc.

Response:

Apart from providing quality education to the students, the college has also taken initiative for the all-around development of students by introducing extracurricular activities through various clubs and cells. These clubs encourage the students to upgrade their skills in extracurricular activities other than academics. The college has clubs for various extracurricular activities such as culture, arts and crafts, sports, yoga, meditation, and Gymnasium led by faculties from various departments. These clubs conduct cultural activities and sports from time to time. The college has one indoor stadium measuring 111 ft x 71 ft and one playground for conducting various sports and games. Yoga and meditation practices were initially carried out under the Self-Empowerment Cell in 2003. Later in 2020, it was divided into Yoga Cell and Meditation Cell. At present, there is no allotted room for the gymnasium but practices of the gymnasium are carried out in the indoor stadium. One auditorium is there for conducting cultural activities and lectures.

The college has a dance club that arranges training classes for students, and experts are invited to impart the classes. There is also a Drama club and music club. There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic, and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms, etc. Though the college does not have a permanent gymnasium, there is equipment

that is being used by students and so we have Intra-faculty and inter-faculty games and sports competitions organized every year for students. The institute has a well-equipped Auditorium for annual functions.

At the time of its inception, the primary needs of the library were fulfilled with the help of donations and contributions of some well-wishers, and thereafter gradually it able to become a modern computerized college library. 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

Response:

Rangia College conducts both internal and external financial audits. The Institution has established a mechanism for conducting internal and external audits on the financial transactions done every year to ensure financial compliance.

Internal audit is conducted yearly by the Accounts Department of the institution in order to ensure maintenance of accounts and audits. An internal audit is done for every payment made by the account branch of the college. Financial documentation is done as per norms and is kept properly in the account branch. The expenses incurred under different heads are thoroughly checked by verifying the bills and vouchers. If any discrepancy is found, the same is brought to the notice of the principal.

In Rangia College, there are certain self-financed courses such as PGDCA, Physical Education, vocational courses, post-graduation in a few subjects, etc. The income and expenditure of all these self-financed courses are properly maintained by the Accounts Department of the institution.

The tax-related matters of the faculty members are consulted with a firm of Chartered Accountants as per the government rules. The auditor ensures that all payments are duly authorized. Any queries in the process of audit would be attended immediately along with the supporting documents within the prescribed time limits. The institution did not come across any major audit objections during the preceding years. All these mechanisms exhibit the transparency being maintained in financial matters and adherence to financial discipline to avoid defalcation of funds or properties of the institution at all levels.

A blog for each department has been opened under the aegis of IQAC which has been connected to the main website of the institution. The prime motive behind the creation of the blog is to enhance the communication between the teachers and the students. The students can know thoroughly about the faculty members of their respective departments as well as the departmental activities done so far. The students can also avail updated information through the blog.

In order to make the teaching-learning process more vibrant and learner-friendly, IQAC of Rangia College has taken another initiative i.e. **E-CONTENT**. Along with the traditional lecture method, the faculty members use ICT-assisted tools in the teaching-learning process. Regarding home assignments and internal assessments, ICT tools are used. Most of the time, WhatsApp is preferred for giving class notes and notices. The concept of google classroom has been converted to practice to some extent. Emphasis has also been given to the development of e-content from each of the departments both in video and audio form. For the convenience of the students, the e-contents have been linked to the main website of Rangia College.

1. Structured feedback system

The feedback system is a method to enhance a system that is in process of evaluation. Feedback should be an integral part to sort out the loophole in the system with the help of the participant of the system. IQAC, Rangia College this year also conduct the student's feedback with the following objectives

OBJECTIVE OF THE STUDENT FEEDBACK

The following objectives are adopted to enhance the quality of the teaching-learning process

1. To enhance the quality of teaching in a classroom
2. To make the teacher aware of the classroom environment while teaching.
3. To motivate teachers for innovation in classroom teaching.

Methodology adopted

1. A routine is prepared for the purpose and departments are asked to allot a class for the purpose on that day as per routine.
2. A questionnaire is prepared in a Google form with ten numbers of questions to check the opinion of a student towards his/her teacher.
3. Respective departments are requested not to attend the feedback class during the process of feedback.
4. The questioner and the method of giving feedback are explained by the invigilation assigned by IQAC.
5. Students are assured that their feedback is secured in all respect.
6. Students are requested to give the score according to the scale given with dignity and integrity.
7. Answer scripts are collected in a dedicated email iqac.rangiacollege@gamil.com/feedback.rangiacollege@gamil.com

The analysis is done by a committee keeping the secrecy so far as an individual is concerned. The feedback has been taken from students, teachers, and parents as well. However, the online feedback system has been introduced as a quality initiative and overall it has made the system more effective. IQAC is planning to make the feedback system robust so as to enhance the efficiency of the teaching and learning process

2. Review of the curricular delivery system

In order to improve the quality of the teaching-learning process, IQAC has implemented the class logbook system where every detail of a class per day has been filled up, by the teacher. The logbook is then sent to the IQAC for verification. The IQAC verifies the log book for each teacher in accordance with class routine and the lesson plan they have submitted in the IQAC. Especially the ICT classes done by the teachers are noted. After verification, the necessary quality improvement inputs are communicated to the concerned teachers. This initiative has resulted in higher efficiency and enhanced quality of pedagogy. All the teachers of the college requested to use ICT tools in order to make their teaching effective.

Response:

Gender equity is the necessary foundation for a peaceful, prosperous and sustainable world. For the faculty members, three ladies' toilets have been arranged especially for the women faculties in the Teachers' Common Room.

The institution has put emphasis not only on ensuring physical facilities but also on making them aware of the aforementioned issue. Here, reference can be made to the ongoing Mentoring and Counseling Programme under the Extension Education Cell of the institution where initiatives have been taken to aware the students about the issue.

Different kinds of clubs are also going on under the Extension Education Cell of Rangia College such as music club, dance club, art & craft club, drama club, literacy club, etc which mold the students to shape their diverse skills.

To redress the grievances of the girl students regarding any kind of sexual harassment, they have been facilitated with a cell named Sexual Harassment Cell. The institution has also facilitated a Grievance Redressal Cell for the convenience of the students.

For the security purpose of the students, a night watchman has been appointed. Provision has also been arranged for lady watchmen so that the girl students can share any issue with them without any kind of hesitation.

Along with all these, since its inception, the Women's Studies Research cell (WSRC) of this institution is trying its level best to ensure a gender-friendly environment not only within the institution but also in the surrounding area. It is worth mentioning that a variety of programs have been organized under the banner of WSRC with emphasis on issues like gender, environment, women's health, hygiene and nutrition, domestic violence, women empowerment, etc.

Response:

Waste management includes the processes and actions required to manage waste from its inception to its final disposal. Waste management deals with all types of waste, including industrial, biological, household, municipal, organic, biomedical, and radioactive wastes. Proper management of waste is important for ensuring a sustainable and livable livelihood.

Understanding the importance of the issue, Rangia College is also not lagging behind. For the management of the different types of waste, both degradable and non-degradable, initiatives have been taken under the aegis of the institution.

For solid waste management, there are two concrete dustbins. One is set behind the library of the institution and another one has been kept behind the college canteen.

Liquid waste has been managed through the construction of proper drainage facilities.

Regarding e-waste management, there is a committee that handles the whole task of e-waste management. Accordingly, under the supervision of the committee, e-waste is auctioned every year. On the one hand, through such an auction system e-waste is managed properly, and on the other, it provides an earning source for the institution.

To recycle the various kinds of waste such as biodegradable and non-biodegradable, the waste management committee of our college has taken several measures. In the case of liquid waste generated in the chemical laboratory, is separated into chlorinated and non-chlorinated solvents which can be reused.

The effluents/ liquid waste from chemicals used in the laboratory Chemistry/ Botany/ Zoology are treated scientifically by making a leak-proof sanitary tank so that the toxic metals/ chemicals reagents cannot percolate through the soil in the surrounding areas. The tank size is sufficient for laboratory waste disposal. The non-biodegradable solid wastes like plastics, cups, etc. generated on the college campus are burnt through incineration.

The college has not only adopted concrete steps for managing the degradable and non-degradable waste but also taken initiatives to aware the students as well as people living in nearby areas regarding the issue. Workshops have been conducted to aware of the reuse of domestic waste material. Along with these, students are made prone to nurturing nature through celebrating World Environment Day, plantation programs, quizzes, etc.

Accordingly, it can be stated that both awareness programs, as well as concrete steps, have been taken into the hand on the part of Rangia College to manage the degradable and non-degradable wastes.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual.

Response:

Best Practice 1:

Title of the Practice:

The title of the practice is “Mentoring and Counseling Programme”.

Objectives of the Practice:

- To empower the students of Rangia College to reach their personal potential and make positive choices in life to fulfill their personal dreams and emerge as self-confident, self-reliant, and empathetic individuals who will make a difference in society.
- To create an environment of holistic learning wherein the teacher and student engage more closely with each other to promote the academic, creative, and mental well-being of the student.
- To nurture and guide the student in order to enhance the quality of education that is provided, by a mentor-mentee relationship between teacher and student.
- To inculcate human values and a spirit of service in the student.
- To equip students to become responsible citizens.

The Context:

With the objective to provide holistic education to the students of Rangia College, the College has introduced the Extension Education Cell. The Mentoring and Counseling program runs under this cell. The program aims to forge a one-to-one relationship between the teacher and students to support and guide them to achieve their personal goals. The Programme also aims to train the students to play leadership roles in society and participate constructively in social issues.

The Practice:

The Programme was initiated on 11th August 2016. Sessions were commenced on 18th August 2016. In the initial year, all the first semester students, (Arts, Science & Commerce), major and general, were mingled and divided into groups of thirty students each. Thus, each group consisted of Science, Arts, and Commerce Students. Forty-five groups were thus created and each group was placed under a Mentor. A total of forty-five Mentors were appointed from among the teachers. The objective was that students of the

various streams to mingle and share a healthy exchange of ideas. Similarly, teachers of various disciplines were appointed as Mentors to enrich the student's experience with a cross-disciplinary approach. With due course of time, the program was redesigned to overcome the challenges faced and it still goes on.

Evidence of Success:

The group of teacher mentors has continued sessions with the mentees. It is seen that trust has been established as the mentees open up to their mentors. A number of issues are touched upon by the mentors as they motivate the mentees. The students have benefitted from the program. Apart from counseling, the Mentors have also exposed them to Soft skills & Communicative skills. Audio-visual shows and inspiring lectures are also screened to motivate the mentees.

Problems Encountered:

While conducting the Programme, a number of challenges are faced, such as accommodating classrooms, class routines and completing syllabi, etc. The mentors find it difficult to accommodate the mentoring sessions into the class and examination schedule. Therefore, in order to make the program more manageable, it has been redesigned from time to time.

Notes:

The practice can bring a tremendous change in making our future citizens mentally sound with human values and a spirit of service towards society to some extent if it extends to other institutions.

Best Practice 2:

Title of the Practice:

The title of the practice is “My Plant, My Responsibility”.

Objectives of the Practice:

It is a tree plantation drive with a motive to involve all students in constructive activities for the welfare of society by planting more trees to combat global warming, make the environment pollution free, and spread awareness among the masses.

The Context:

The trees play an important role in supporting life on the planet where we are in. But sadly, there are some issues and challenges that are causing damage to life and the ecosystem of our planet. It is directly or indirectly connected to not only the environment but to everyone that lives on the earth. As we are aware of the fact that the main challenging sources of the planet are pollution, global warming, greenhouse gas effect, and many others. Most importantly, human activities are significantly responsible for such environmental degradation. There are numbers of environmental issues, among which deforestation is noteworthy.

Through the concept “My plant, My Responsibility”, we are trying to be aware of the future generation of environmental effects and trying to maintain a balanced eco-system by planting more and more trees.

The Practice:

The practice wants to involve all the students in plantation activity. Every newly enrolled student is given a sapling on the day of their admission to the college. So, all the newly enrolled students are our target for each year. Certain rules are followed during the exercise of the practice –

- At least one sapling of selected species has to be planted.
- Students are responsible for the collection, nurturing, and growth of the sapling.
- The location, date, and identification of the plant and the planter must be properly marked.
- The growth of the sapling must be recorded and submitted to the teacher in charge for verification.
- The record will be evaluated semester-wise. It will be considered as documental proof for the next semester's admission.

Accordingly, under this practice, the student has to promise that he/she will plant a sapling in a place of his/her convenience, in the name of the protection of the environment of the earth. He/she will nourish and protect the plant. He/she will help with the activities related to the protection of the environment of soil, air, and water as a whole.

Evidence of Success:

All students have been given a report card at the time of admission and the record card has been evaluated semester-wise. In the first semester, the students are introduced to the plant where they have to provide information regarding the date and location of the plant, name of the plant (local), scientific name, height, the protection given, etc. through the report card. In the second semester, criteria like general health of the plant, protection given, application of manure, availability of water, and sunlight are observed. These criteria are checked till the sixth semester. Students have to give even pictorial evidence to show the growth of the sapling. All the newly enrolled students are the target population for the activity each year.

The results doubtlessly show positive indication and will definitely bring fruitful results in the long run.

Problems:

Not all the students can provide proper nourishment to their saplings resulting premature death of a number of saplings. Further, many students do not have proper land for plantations, especially those who belong to the urban setup.

Notes:

The practice can bring a tremendous change in making our planet green to some extent if it extends to other institutions.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Rangia College is the premier institution of higher education on the north bank of the river Brahmaputra in the district of Kamrup. Founded on August 5, 1963, the college has rendered pioneering services to the community by catering to the needs of the vast and extensive area inhabited predominantly by socially and economically backward segments of the population.

Although there are various distinct areas, Rangia College has always tried to maintain its distinctiveness in its academic arena. It has already been mentioned that the college is situated in a rural area covering the socially and economically backward population. In such a rural setup, Rangia College is offering Post Graduate courses along with Under Graduate courses, and vocational courses to cater to the needs of the student community which shows its distinctiveness.

In the ongoing education system, it is seen that most of the higher education institutions are following the traditional pattern of giving education which is adding a new dimension to the burning issue of unemployment. At this juncture, this institution is maintaining its distinctiveness by giving the opportunity to the students to enter into vocational courses.

Another area that has maintained the academic distinctiveness of the institution is the enrollment of nearly 3000 students which is a remarkable number of students enrollment.

In the various colleges of Assam, the students are getting the opportunity to enroll into different streams as per their choices. But there are only a few colleges which have the facility of all the streams. Amongst those few numbers within the state of Assam, Rangia College is a pioneer institution which is successfully continuing all the three streams i.e. Arts, Science and Commerce.

Moreover, Rangia College is such an institution where a student can continue his or her study from the higher secondary courses up to the post graduate courses which is very rare in case of the other colleges. Here Rangia College is distinct with the inclusion of Higher Secondary, Under Graduate and Post Graduate Courses.

The distinctiveness of the College can also be identified from the point of view of the enrollment of international students. Students from the neighboring country Bhutan also come every year to study in the institution.

Along with all these, the greatest thrust which has helped in maintaining the distinctiveness of the institution is the unity in diversity. Till the date students belonging to diverse religion and culture are

getting enrolled in the Rangia College. It is true not only in case of the students but also regarding the faculty members. But in spite of all such diversities, there is no chaos within the institution. The students as well as the teachers have been given space in following their culture and religion. Here it is worth mentioning that Fateha, a holy festival of the people belonging to Islamic religion and a holy festival of the Bodo people as well as Sankardeva Mahotsav, an Assamese are equally celebrated within the college campus. Moreover, students are allowed to wear ethnic dresses as their uniform.

Accordingly, through all these initiatives Rangia College is maintaining its distinctiveness.
